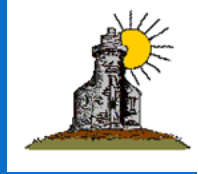

Spotlight on Reporting

We have spent the last year consulting with parents, staff and researching the benefits to school reports. It was very clear that there was little benefit to receiving an end of year progress report when the information for helping your child was too late to do anything about.

Taking this onboard and the Government's latest information on Family Learning, we want to work with you to better understand and engage in the learning process. With this in mind we have revamped our reporting structure.

Reports will be issued throughout the year, focusing on one particular area, showing evidence of your child's input to their learning but just as importantly giving next steps that you can do to give your child an advantage over their learning.

When reports are given out they will be in a folder that **should be returned to school** promptly. These folders will be accessible to the children regularly and we would welcome feedback on your child's learning each term.

We want to get your child's learning right and we can only do this with your help.

Reporting should be seen as more than just a formal written report and open day/evenings are shown at the back of this newsletter. As well as these more casual days, we will of course offer you a Parents Evening. This will be offered through our Groupcall system meaning you can book out times that you can make.

There is also an opportunity to have a say in what you want to see at the end of assembly when you return back to class. Assembly is another opportunity to report. We will offer a choice of foci via our Xpressions App. Out of 300+ children only 75 parents have not enrolled. Are you missing out on having your say? Visit your app store on your phone to download the app.

As with anything new, we will make mistakes and things may seem a little rushed to start. We promote stretch mistakes in our school – we are only trying to make things better.

The Primary Ones have made a fantastic start to their primary school journey. On our first day, it was amazing to visit the classrooms and see all the boys and girls busy: learning happily with their friends. They are also learning to read some of the most common words in the English language. These are all important skills which will help them to become competent readers. Continuing to share lots of stories at home, pointing to the words and talking about the plot and pictures will be so beneficial to your child's progress. Encouraging colouring in, cutting out and doing up zips and buttons will support this work further. This year saw the school move ahead in the following areas.

Growth Mindset.

Failure is always an option! Have you had your child state that you should find your brain growing if you make a mistake? We have been working hard to promote stretch mistakes- mistakes that are made because we are trying that little bit harder.

Raising Attainment

We are proud to say that we have significantly raised attainment in nearly all levels within Reading, Writing and Numeracy. We continue to monitor this and try to get even better.

Total Communication

We have recently been awarded our Bronze Award for Total Communication. We are aware that all learners communicate in a different way and we now have visual timetables, visual key chains and visual signs around the school. Almost 90% of our staff are trained in Makaton and we will not stop until we reach 100%.

The Nursery continue to teach all children in the school the Makaton sign of the week.

Where we are going next....?

We continue our journey on Maths and will look at more resources to engage learners. A big focus will be on effective reporting to parents as well as looking at Homework through previews.

Keeping our children safe continues to be a priority for Laurencekirk School.

Using the Getting It Right For Every Child approach to Child Protection promotes action to improve the well-being of all children in 8 areas;

Safe, Healthy, Achieving, Nurtured, Active, Respected, Responsible and Included.

Parents/carers have the ultimate responsibility in safeguarding, supporting and promoting the well-being of their child.

All staff that work with children have a role to play in ensuring that a child's needs are met, and work in partnership with other agencies to ensure the protection of children.

If you have any concerns regarding the safety and well-being of a child please contact myself, Mr Boyd or the local Social Work office.

Please refer to the school handbook and website or Aberdeenshire Council website for more details about Child Protection in Aberdeenshire.

At Laurencekirk we will always put the child first and would ask for your support if we have to verify situations that have been disclosed to us, no matter how sensitive.

Attendance issues

Part of our responsibility is also to ensure children attend school. We will be adopting a text and letter service if children's attendance becomes a cause for concern and inviting parents to meetings to support them in increasing their child's attendance. Any attendance that is below 90% needs to be reported to the Education Department.
